### **DRAINAGE, DITCHES & FLOODING**

At the time of writing we have enjoyed three heat waves with only the occasional cloud burst. One of the measures advised by Katie Spillman, the District Council surface water drainage officer/ditch warden, was to keep the nine drainage "grips" cut into the verges on Grove Lane free of vegetation and sediment. This has now been done and they will continued to be monitored through the coming autumn months.

### SEE YOU AT THE VILLAGE HALL SUMMER FETE

The Parish Council will be having a stand at the village fete taking place on **14th September 2025.** Andrew Patrick is providing his gazebo so come rain or shine there will be cover. Please feel free to drop by for a chat with him or one of the others to hear about our ongoing work, ask any questions or raise any concerns you may have.

### SPEEDING IN THE VILLAGE

The Council operates two SAM2 (speed awareness machines) which are moved to fixed locations on Church Road and Low Road on a monthly basis. They light up showing passing vehicle speed over the 30mph speed limit. Each vehicle passing them is counted and their speed recorded. This information is then downloaded and posted on the parish council website and also shared with our Local Beat Manager/Police Officer.

The latest monthly data download for Low Road indicated 19,659 vehicle counts, with 5,863 vehicle counts above the clearly signposted 30 mph limit. Our Beat Manager has escalated the issue to the Police Camera Safety Team who, have agreed to conduct some speed enforcement activity along Low Road.

#### **ROLLBACK THE STONES**

The wet weather that the autumn brings can wash gravel and the residue of summer building work from driveways onto our footpaths and block road drainage grates. Please be considerate and sweep the gravel back onto your driveways.

### **Local Community First Responder Group**

### ANSWERING THE CALL: HOW CFRS SUPPORT OUR COMMUNITY

Following my recent visit to the parish council meeting, I wanted to share a bit more detail about how Community First Responders (CFRs) operate, and what happens behind the scenes when we respond to a 999 call. CFRs are local volunteers trained by the ambulance service to attend lifethreatening emergencies in the minutes before an ambulance crew can arrive. We are not a replacement for ambulance crews, but we're trained to deliver immediate care such as CPR, defibrillation, oxygen therapy, and basic patient monitoring. Our presence can make a crucial difference during those first few minutes, especially in rural communities like ours, where ambulance response times can be longer.

We're on call during times that suit our personal schedules. When available, we use a secure app on our CFR phone to "sign on for duty." This tells the Ambulance Operations Centre (AOC) in Hellesdon that we're ready to respond and shows our location on their dispatch screens. When a 999 call comes in and is triaged as a suitable emergency, such as cardiac arrest, chest pain, seizures, or someone unconscious, the control room checks who the closest available CFR is.

If we're within a suitable distance, we're dispatched immediately. We receive incident details on our device, including the address, nature of the emergency, any known risks, and directions. We then head straight to the scene using our own vehicles, equipped with our issued medical kit and equipment.

Upon arrival, we begin patient care straight away, working within the scope of our training. This might mean starting CPR, attaching a defibrillator, taking observations like pulse and oxygen levels, or simply providing reassurance and monitoring until the ambulance crew arrives. Once the crew is on scene, we hand over, share key information, and assist where needed before making ourselves available again.

We never know exactly what we'll be called to, but every call is a chance to make a difference, sometimes helping to save a life, other times simply being a calm and caring presence during a frightening time. Being a CFR is incredibly rewarding, and it's all about supporting our community when it matters most. If you've ever wondered how you could contribute in a meaningful way, I encourage you to find out more. No prior medical experience is needed, just a willingness to help, a calm head, and a few hours to spare each week.

### **Every Garden Counts**

You might not be aware, but parish and town councils must now have biodivestly policies under the Environment Act of 2021, with the air conserving and enhancing biodiversity. This means making as much of the parish as wildlifer friendly as possible. The Parish Council does manage as areas – but our gardens cover a large area too. In England, gardens total an area about the same as Suffolk, so they have the potential to make a considerable contribution to helping wildlife and biodiversity nationwide – however big or small they are individually.

If you are already doing your bit to help wildlife, thank you! But there is always scope to do more. The most important tip is to be less tidy - creating more space for nature.

#### Here are some simple tips:

- . Grow more flowers, shrubs and trees
- Make leaf and/or log piles
- Provide water, whether it is a small bowlful, or a pond
   Install bird and bat boxes
- . Build bug hotels
- Turn off or reduce nocturnal lights: they can have a negative effect on wildlife - particularly insects and birds
- Avoid using pesticides
- Cut your grass and hedges less often
   Leave some areas to grow wild even if it is only a square yard
- Applying these tips will improve ALL the wildlife in your garden, from the

invertebrates at the bottom of the food chain through to the birds and small mammals at the top.

Most of our wildlife is in decline due to development, loss of habitat, and modern agriculture. We can all do our bit in our gardens, knowing that they really DO count.

### **Norfolk County Council**

Norfolk County Council has announced a new series of household hazardous waste days (HHWDs) this autumn, offering residents the opportunity to safely dispose of unwanted hazardous materials at seven recycling centres across the county.

The autumn Household Hazard Waste day for South will take place at Harford Recycling Centre on the following dates:

### • Norwich South - Friday 3 and Saturday 4 October

These are free events put on by Norfolk County Council, which give residents right across the county the opportunity to safely dispose of hazardous waste items such as flammable liquids or pesticides. As with the spring events, the Council will use the recycling centres' booking system to manage demand and ensure smooth operations. Bookings can be made online or by phone and will be open a week before the event.

### POSTAL VOTE RE-APPLICATIONS 2025 - 2026

If your postal vote is due to expire in January 2026, you may have already been contacted by email this year to remind you to re-apply in advance.

#### **RENEWING YOUR POSTAL VOTE**

The Elections Act 2022 introduced new rules for postal votes. From 31 October 2023:

All postal vote applications must contain your name, address, date of birth, National Insurance number and signature. When you apply to vote by post your identity is checked against information held by the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP). In some instances, this identity check fails, and you will be asked to supply evidence of your identity. Postal votes are valid for a maximum of 3 years.

If you applied for a permanent postal vote before 31 October 2023, your postal vote will expire on 31 January 2026. When your postal vote expires, you will need to make a new application.

#### WHY WE ARE GETTING IN TOUCH NOW

We are contacting electors who applied for their postal vote before 31 October 2023 to ask them to re-apply as soon as possible.

You can re-apply online at https://www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote

We have 38,000 postal voters who need to make a new application before 31 January 2026. We have started the re-application process early to allow voters plenty of time to re-apply should they wish to do so.

You can apply online at any time by visiting www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote.

The deadline to re-apply is 31 January 2026. If you do not respond and submit a new application, your postal vote will expire on this date.

For me, running this race was truly one of the most incredible experiences of my life — unforgettable, emotional, and at times, absolutely gruelling. In the week leading up to race day, I faced a setback: a knee pain that set me back in my mental preparation for the race, thinking that I wouldn't be able to run the race. But with prayers, relaxation, and determination, I chose to stand on that start line — and I'm so glad I did.

I started strong, and by 7km, it looked like I might even finish under one hour. Shortly after, my pain flared up again. It was intense, and the unseasonably warm weather didn't help. My pace slowed, and the remaining 3km of the race became a real test of resilience — not just physically, but mentally and emotionally too.

Yet, as each kilometer passed by, something beautiful happened. I met inspiring runners with powerful stories of their own — people overcoming challenges far greater than mine, whilst pushing forward with unwavering spirit. I was continually lifted by the cheers of strangers who appeared along the route; they shouted my name like I was leading the race. Their faces, their words, their presence — they carried me when I felt like I couldn't go on.

The Gold Coast Marathon also showcased the very best of humanity. Runners supporting each other in the toughest moments — pats on the back, fist bumps of encouragement, quiet words of kindness between heavy breaths. We were strangers, but we were united.

Crossing that finish line was a moment I'll never forget. I was smiling and crying at the same time. Despite the pain and challenges, I did it!

And I am deeply humbled by the love, encouragement, and generosity I've received — from family, friends, Norwich residents, and church members, and every single person who has supported my journey or donated to fundraising.

Once again, thank you from the bottom of my heart. You helped me believe I could do it. To conclude, running a marathon entails pain. Not only in the running itself, but also the soreness it causes in the days following as the body recovers.

In our daily lives, there will be times when we will experience pain and suffering. There will be times when we are driven to despair.

I pray that at those times that God will provide us support, love and encouragement, through friends and strangers we encounter on our path - 1 Thessalonians 5:11.



However, with the cost of mortgages, food and heating soaring, more and more people find themselves unable to make ends meet. Statistics show that the people most likely to be struggling are young families where both parents may be in regular employment. If this is you, please do not struggle on in silence. Tasburgh United Charities are here to help **ALL** residents of Tasburgh, regardless of age or employment status.

If you do know someone who you believe is facing hardship but may be reluctant to seek help, please do try to persuade them to apply to us. We hate to think that anyone may be struggling but be too proud to seek help. We never judge anyone, and all applications are treated with discretion and in the strictest confidence.

Usually, assistance is given in the form of a payment towards general living expenses. However, we can also arrange a delivery of heating oil, or make a one-off payment towards a particular large expense, such as a new oil tank, a new baby in the family, funeral expenses or a school trip. if you are a student off to university this year, or beginning an apprenticeship, even if you are still living at home, we can also make a contribution towards your costs, such as books, new PC or just living expenses.



### TASBURGH BECOMES A MINDFUL VILLAGE

In June, Tasburgh officially became a 'Mindful Village' after several residents completed Mental Health Awareness training provided by South Norfolk and Broadland District Council.

In future editions of the Quarterly, we'll explore different aspects of mental health—how you can support your own wellbeing and where to turn if you need additional help. This article introduces the idea of a Mindful Village and what it could mean for you as a Tasburgh resident.

A Mindful Village is a community that looks out for one another, especially when it comes to mental health. In practical terms, if you're living in Tasburgh and experiencing difficulties with your mental wellbeing, you can reach out for help and guidance from trained members of the community.



Eight local residents have trained as 'Mindful Wellbeing Champions'—some of whom are pictured above. If you're not comfortable speaking to someone you know, you can also contact the Community Connector at the Long Stratton doctors' surgery. Just make an appointment to talk—about anything, not just mental health concerns. The Community Connector can then guide you to the right support for your specific needs.

If you'd like to speak with a Mental Health Champion, come and say hello at the village fete this year— we'd love to meet you.

### **Tasburgh History Society**

#### SIR CHARLES HARVEY

Sir Charles Harvey came to live at Rainthorpe Hall following his purchase of the estate in 1878 but he already had family connections to the area. His grandfather, General Sir Robert John Harvey, who had served with distinction as the Duke Of Wellington's ADC in the Peninsula War against Napoleon's army and been knighted for his services, had inherited an estate at Tharston which is why so many of the farms and other properties are named after battles in that campaign. Sir Charles however had not been knighted but had inherited his title as the 2<sup>nd</sup> Baronet of Crown Point on the death of his father, the 1<sup>st</sup> Baronet, in 1870.

The family had been prominent citizens of Norwich, firstly as textile merchants in the 1700s and then as joint owners of the Harvey and Hudson Bank which opened in 1801, and it was for services to banking that his father had been awarded a baronetcy, taking its name from the Crown Point estate at Whitlingham which he had purchased. Unfortunately his father lost a lot of the bank's money, speculating on the stock exchange, and committed suicide. The Crown Point estate, including Whitlingham Hall, had to be sold to clear his debts, and was bought by the Colman family, but there were sufficient funds remaining from that and his grandfather's will trust to enable Sir Charles to live a comfortable life as a country landowner. He was also a director of Gurney's Bank which had bought out his family's failed banking operation, and was later to become part of Barclays Bank.

With these resources he not only bought, but greatly expanded the Rainthorpe estate by the acquisition of farms and other properties in Tasburgh and adjoining villages, but also paid for restorations and improvements to the parish church and supported the school. Although he had sold off outlying farms before he died in 1928, when the remainder of the estate was auctioned the following year it still included virtually all of the land and properties on either side of Saxlingham Lane and Low Road as far as and including the mill, up to and including the hill fort and across to Old Hall Farm and the main road. A memorial to him and his wife can be found on the back wall of the church of which he was also a church warden.

Sir Charles' younger son, Oliver Charles Harvey GCMG, GCVO, CB, joined the Diplomatic Service, and later served as the British Ambassador to France from 1948 to 1954. On leaving office he was granted a life peerage as Baron Harvey of Tasburgh and when he died in 1975 he was buried at Tasburgh church, which his father had done so much to preserve.


### LEEK, BACON AND BUTTERBEAN RISOTTO

Leeks begin to come into season in the early autumn and become the star of this dish when well caramelised. The butterbeans are a superfood and make the risotto especially creamy. This makes a well-rounded veggie dish without the addition of the bacon in favour of well browned and salted mushrooms.

INGREDIENTS: Serves: 4

can of butterbeans around 200g streaky bacon chopped into small pieces

1 large leek
1 clove garlic
small brown onion, finely chopped
50g butter
50g parmesan
500ml vegetable stock
300g risotto rice
few sprigs of rosemary



Once the ingredients are prepared, begin by cooking the onion and garlic in a large pan on medium heat until soft and beginning to brown. Add the bacon and cook for a further few minutes. Add the risotto rice to the pan with the butter and parmesan, allow the butter to melt while stirring well. Add the stock (veg stock cubes and powder are available in most supermarkets and can give a depth of flavour to more plant-based dishes) and rosemary, stir again and cover.

Meanwhile, slice the leek into rounds and place in a smaller separate pan with plenty of oil on a high heat, cook for around 15 minutes with plenty of salt and pepper until reaching a rich brown colour on both sides. Every few minutes, uncover the risotto and stir, adding a little more butter and parmesan as you go. When the leek is ready, drain the beans and add to the main pan with the leek, cook for another few minutes to allow the beans to heat through and the flavours to combine.

The theme of this year's annual Centenary Salver Competition held at Honingham Village Hall was a historic Norfolk person born pre 1900. Our WI was represented by Caroline, Cynthia and Gill who chose Anne Boleyn, who was born at Blickling Hall, and five various crafts from a choice of nine classes were undertaken to interpret the theme with staging completed by Carol and Gill. At our May meeting they were congratulated on being joint first with City WI.

A very humourous evening was held in May when members were treated to the return of Greg Powles, a freelance writer and performer. He gave a whimsical look at his career up to the present day, with all the many mishaps along the way, from being cast in a major film starring Stephanie Beacham, Mel Smith, Jane Horrocks and Richard O'Brien at the age of 15, to writing plays for schools, working on North Norfolk Radio and creating a new play based on the effects on the Far East Prisoners of War (FEPOWs) when they returned home after release and how family life was impacted by their experiences in subsequent years, to be performed at Norwich Castle to commemerate VJ Day in August.

At our June meeting Susan Parry gave a talk on the five women who are widely believed to have been murdered in 1888 by Jack the Ripper in Whitechapel, London illustrated by photos of the victims and their place of death. She began with the first victim Mary Ann Nichols giving a detailed history of her life followed by Annie Chapman, Elizabeth Stride, Catherine Eddowes and Mary Jane Kelly.

At the National Annual Meeting in June a resolution 'Bystanders Can Be Life Savers' was passed to increase public confidence and training in the delivery of CPR, and to work with local organisations to help to improve access to defibrillators in their communities to give every person the best chance of surviving a cardiac arrest. As a consequence members were invited to a demonstration by David and Julia representing East Anglian Air Ambulance and were able to practise CPR and using defrillators on the mannikins they had brought with them.

Maria Pennington, who had been in the jewellery trade for 44 years, having worked in London as a window dresser, jewellery designer and formerly at Winsor Bishop in Norwich joined us at our July meeting. She illustrated with photographs different types of jewellery and how the fashions of the day had influenced styles of jewellery. After her talk members were invited to view a table display of jewellery.

In August we will be visiting Bury St. Edmunds on our annual outing but you are welcome to join us on the second Thursday of the month at Wacton Village Hall at 7.30pm when our speaker for September will talk about being a teacher in local prisons.
