Welcome to this issue of Tasburgh Quarterly.

BUDGET

Recent meetings of the Parish Council have been largely occupied with setting the budget for next year. In common with everybody else, many of our costs have increased over this last year. However, we are also mindful of the problems many of you face with the cost of living. Therefore, next year's Parish Council share of Council Tax will rise by only 1.63%, bringing the figure for a Band D property to £59.67.

DEFIBRILLATOR

This is one item that has been included in the budget for next year as the defibrillator at the village hall now needs replacing. The current one is nearing the end of its recommended life span, and there are many newer models available. Remember.

IF YOU SUSPECT SOMEONE IS HAVING A HEART ATTACK DIAL 999 IMMEDIATELY.

Tell the operator you are in Tasburgh and that you know where the defibrillator is located and the operator will give you a code to access the defibrillator. The machine will talk you through exactly what you need to do!

WEATHER

The weather continues to be unusually wet and stormy this winter. Remember, if floodwater is threatening your property, contact Norfolk County Council emergency flood line number on 0344 800 8013. Following the death of a motorist in the ford at Shotesham, the ford on the Low Road was recently closed by Norfolk Highways and may be again if heavy rain returns. Even if not closed, this ford can be dangerous – several vehicles get stuck every winter so please don't take risks. Also beware of flooding on Flordon Hill and drive carefully if flooded.

PLAY AREA

The surfacing under the play equipment at the Village Hall has recently been refilled and returfed, making a safer surface if a child were to suffer a fall. I would like to express my thanks to everyone who gave up a morning to come and help with this. it couldn't have been done without you.

We are still working on raising funds to replace the 2 bay flat swing which fell foul to rot.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The Plan has taken further steps towards completion. The Examiners report has now been received, and we are hopeful that it will go to a village referendum early in the new financial year. Watch out for publicity and the date for this soon.

LONG STRATTON BY-PASS

Work is due to start very shortly – many decades after the need for it was first mooted! This will inevitably cause some traffic hold-ups at certain times, but hopefully will be well worth the effort when completed. In connection with the by-pass, two councillors recently attended a meeting with Norfolk County Council to discuss the effect that it could have on the A140. Concerns about the increase in traffic were raised, along with existing problems exiting on to the road, especially if turning right, the lack of safe footpaths and cycle routes, and also about traffic using Low Road as a cut through to exit at the roundabout instead.

HERITAGE FIELD DOG BIN

We have received complaints from the team at South Norfolk District Council who empty our dog bins. PLEASE, if the bin on the Heritage Field is full, do not leave your poo bags on top of it, or underneath. A crew member has to pick these up, not pleasant especially in wet weather. It would also be extremely dangerous for the sheep when they return to the Heritage field if one of them ingested one of the bags on the ground. This happened at Caistor Roman Town and as a result the sheep died. There are other bins available not a stones throw away located at the Village Hall and the junction of Henry Preston Road, or you can place the bags in your own black bin at home.

We ended 2023 in stonkingly good style with an abundance of good cheer over the holiday period. By the same token, this iniquitous tax bites into our profitability and thus reduces our ability to invest in our local community and charities. A win for the government of the day, regardless of its hue, but a loss for Tasburgh.

And we cannot start the year without a deeply heartfelt apology to all our members for the shambles of our January 2024 Burns Night. For 15 straight years, we've invested in this tribute to the indecipherable Scottish Bard to such an extent that the annual celebration of his birth has become something of a village institution. Alas, this year was simply an utter debacle with its

LANDLINE TELEPHONE DIGITAL SWITCH OVER

What is the landline telephone digital switchover?

The UK's telephone network is changing. Between now and 2025 the old analogue telephone landlines will be upgraded to landline services using digital technology. This means that in the future, landline calls will be delivered over digital technology called Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP), which uses a broadband connection.

Do you or someone you know depend on their landline and/or use a telecare device connected to a phone line such as a fall monitor, lifeline or personal alarm?

If yes, then please notify the communications provider now (the provider of this service) so that they can advise on how the switch might affect the service of the devices or home phone.

Why is it happening?

The UK is upgrading its telephone network from the old analogue system to a new digital system. This means that by 2025, landline calls will be made using the internet instead of traditional phone lines. This is happening because the old system is becoming outdated and expensive to maintain.

Will it affect me?

The good news is that your landline isn't going anywhere and for most people, this change will be straightforward. But if you, or a relative, use any of the following types of service that rely on a telephone landline then this will affect you: landline telephone for making calls. telecare service Fire alarm Burglar alarm.

What do I need to do?

In most cases you don't need to do anything until your provider tells you that your telephone service is changing.

However, if you or someone you know is dependent on a landline telephone, or a service that relies on it, such as a telecare device, personal alarm, or burglar/fire alarm, then it is recommended that you check with the provider of the service to see what their plans are for the service, and when they expect the changes to happen. They will also be able to advise on whether the device will need to be upgraded or replaced.

When the switchover finally happens for you, and if you already have an internet connection, the change may be as simple as plugging your phone into your broadband router rather than the socket on the wall.

Spring 2024 Tasburgh and Tharston Church Newsletter





With the arrival of the month of February the evenings are gradually getting lighter, and signs of spring are beginning to appear. The first spring flowers are bursting into life and the trees and shrubs are beginning to stir out of their winter slumber. As a keen gardener I am looking forward to the prospect of getting out into the garden once again and I have already been sorting through my seed packets to see what I can set first.

February also sees the beginning of Lent, a season which begins on Ash Wednesday, which this year is on 14th February which is also St. Valentine's Day - a day of celebrating love in our culture.

The season of Lent, a period of 40 days (46 if you include Sundays) reminds us of the time Jesus spent in the wilderness before his ministry began.

Many traditions have grown up around Lent. Some people find it helpful to give something up, for example chocolate, as the season is one of fasting. Others take something up, committing maybe to spending more time in prayer or reading the Bible or Lent book; others commit to learning a Bible verse each day. All have their own advantages and help prepare us for Easter Day.

To begin Lent, many Christians will attend a service on Ash Wednesday. During the service they will receive the sign of the cross, in ash prepared from last year's palm crosses, on our foreheads with the words "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ". This reminds us of our own mortality and our need of repentance, saying sorry for the things we have done wrong, and asking for God's forgiveness.

Lent gives us the opportunity to grow closer to God, and so be ready to meet the risen Lord on Easter Day, which this year is on the 31° of March. It is lovely to think that by the time Easter comes our gardens will be bursting with new life, reminding us of the new life that God offers to us through His Son Jesus Christ.

However, you prepare for Easter, I pray you will have a very holy and peaceful Lent.

There is a tradition in the Church of England that Holy Communion is taken to those at home who are unable to get to church because of illness or other circumstances



Norfolk Archaeological Trust



Last year NAT, in partnership with Norfolk Records Office, were fortunate in securing funding from the National Lottery Heritage fund for the project 'The Norfolk Archaeological Trust: It's Centenary and beyond (NAT100 for short) The project is helping us to celebrate a hundred years of NAT and help us with our resilience for the future.

The past 100 years has seen many challenges for NAT; a fire in 1933 that destroyed Sprowston Mill, the day before NAT was due to take ownership of it, bomb damage of its sites in the Second World War, and in more recent years the impact on its sites of climate change, heritage crime and antisocial behaviour.

IS A HEAT PUMP RIGHT FOR MY HOME IF IT'S NOT A NEWBUILD?

There has been lots written about heat pumps in the press over the last five or ten years, much of it unfavourable. But if we are to transition to a more sustainable way of heating our homes and buildings, heat pumps are an important part of the solution. So, when it comes to changing your existing boiler, if you are thinking of a heat pump, what can you do to ensure that it's a success?

There are a few component parts to understand before making any decisions, how heat pumps work, how the building you want it to heat is built and what existing heating emitter systems (radiators) you have.

When it comes to the heat pump there are a few types; air source, ground source and a less often used water source. Whatever the 'source' of heat, the pump works the same way by taking low grade heat (from air, ground or water) and compressing it (like a fridge does but in reverse). Their efficiency (how much they cost to run) is based on something complicatedly sounding called a coefficient of performance or COP. You will see this as a ratio 3:1, 8:1 etc, which is telling you that the heat pump takes 1 unit of electricity to make 3 units of usable heat (3:1).

The second and most important part is your building. Its shape, size, what it was built out of and when, will it have a significant impact. Heat escapes out of buildings through all the external surfaces just at different rates, through the walls, floors, through the roof, windows and doors but also through gaps around these. A typical period home can lose as much as 30 percent of its heat from draughts. So, insulating the roof, perhaps changing windows and updating doors may well be necessary.

Heat pumps work best with underfloor heating but that's not a deal breaker. Remembering that the heat is lower in the system, when it comes to your heating it may be necessary to change some of your radiators for larger ones.

All this can clearly be expensive so the best and most financially savvy way to approach it is over time (5 years). All the while this upfront investment will be beginning to pay you back. The Energy Savings Trust research showed that loft insulation, which could set you back a typical £880, can save you up to £240 a year on your gas bill.

Tasburgh Treats

EASY CHICKEN AND CHORIZO PIE

This is a recipe for pie, simplified, and is a great way to use pre-cooked chicken, especially if there is not quite enough of it to make a meal. You can add extra vegetables to the filling, peas, spinach, other quick-cooking greens or mushrooms would work well. This dish is filling and cosy but a good transitional meal as we move into warmer months. Of course it is best served with potatoes and veg.

Serves: 4

INGREDIENTS:

1 medium-sized leek
300g of cooked chicken (more or less is fine)
100g chorizo sausage
50g butter
100g cream cheese
50g parmesan cheese
1tbsp oregano
2 cloves of garlic
400ml chicken stock
1 sheet of ready-to-roll puff pastry



Start by heating the oven to 190 degrees, use a large oven-proof dish. Use your hands to shred the chicken into bitesize pieces, slice the chorizo and the leeks and crush or finely chop the garlic. Heat up or make the chicken stock.

Add the chicken, chorizo, leeks, garlic, butter, cream cheese and oregano, grate over the parmesan then pour over the chicken stock. Use a fork to mix together the filling, the butter and cheeses should begin to melt and form a sauce but the filling will further combine while it cooks.

Cook, uncovered, for 15 minutes then take out of the oven. Place over the top the sheet of puff pastry, fit to the dish or cut off any excess and brush with a little milk or egg wash.

Bake again for 15-20 minutes until golden brown in colour. Take out and serve.

News from down on the Allotments

February is never the most inspiring month to write an allotment report. It's naturally been a quiet few months on the site but as I write this, during the first weekend of February, the temperature has shot up to 13 degrees C and the weather is reasonably dry. Its led to a rise in activity amongst the plot holders and few were spotted on Saturday afternoon, almost basking in the sunshine.

I can report, it's definitely been a bit windy of late. Since the last Quarterly we've had Storm ('potential to cause disruption or damage') Debi in November, Elin, Fergus and Gerrit in December, with Henk, Isha and Jocelyn in January. That's quite a run considering the previous year (2022-23) storm season (stats run September – August) record only four all year (see met office.gov/storm centre for further fascinating storm facts). You can even offer up a name for future years if you fancy.

Due to this blustery spate, we've had a few shed casualties.

One new shed, on the western front of the site, bore the brunt of these storms and was eventually just left laying down over Christmas, to save effort, after multiple tip overs Its now fully secured and ready for all that nature can throw at it.



Other shed problems unfortunately don't have an amusing slant. During this winter we have had multiple break ins. Shockingly, twice in as many days over the Christmas period. It seems mindless as we've nothing worth taking. All that results, is a load of broken windows, locks and a lot of wasted time for all concerned, including the culprits. We are continuing to employ an increase in measures to combat this upsetting situation. As a rural police force (such as Norfolk is) they consider allotment theft and vandalism very seriously. They are watching... Obviously, don't tackle anyone yourselves but if you happen to be walking the dog or visiting the bar and see some suspicious behaviour on the site, please make a note of the date and time and report it to us. Thanks

Security against other pests also continues with fence extensions being installed and we've had our annual muck delivery plonked over the fence from Gerald Barnes. Thank you Gerald.

HOW IS THE 'COST OF LIVING CRISIS' AFFECTING YOU? PLEASE DO NOT CHOOSE BETWEEN HEAT OR FOOD HELP MAY BE AVAILABLE

Tasburgh United Charities have a certain amount of money available each year to use in assisting residents of the Parish who, regardless of age, situation or reason, find themselves in need of financial help.

The 'Cost of Living Crisis' has seriously affected everyone, including many of us who were formerly financially secure. Traditionally, the Charities helped the ill, old and unemployed. However, with the cost of mortgages, food and heating soaring, more and more people find themselves unable to make ends meet. Statistics show that the people most likely to be struggling are young families where both parents may be in regular employment. If this is you, please do not struggle on in silence. Tasburgh United Charities are here to help **ALL** residents of Tasburgh, regardless of age or employment status.

If you do know someone who you believe is facing hardship but may be reluctant to seek help, please do try to persuade them to apply to us. We hate to think that anyone may be struggling but be too proud to seek help. We never judge anyone, and all applications are treated with discretion and in the strictest confidence.

Usually, assistance is given in the form of a payment towards general living expenses. However, we can also arrange a delivery of heating oil, or make a one-off payment towards a particular large expense, such as a new oil tank, a new baby in the family or a school trip.

If you are a student off to university this year, or beginning an apprenticeship, even if you are still living at home, we can also make a contribution towards your costs, such as books, new PC or just living expenses.

THE SHOEMAKER WHO FOUGHT AT THE BATTLE OF WATERLOO

Until the last century the majority of the population had to walk everywhere, so it's no surprise that Tasburgh had its share of shoe and bootmakers. One of them was Richard Warnes who was born in Wymondham in 1793. His wife Sarah had been born in Tasburgh which is where they chose to bring up their family, their eldest, also called Richard, being born in 1823 followed by George, Hebron and three daughters. The 1841 census records him as a shoemaker, living in part of what is now Commerce House on Low Road but which at the time was divided into two properties. Ten years later, both George and Hebron were also working as shoemakers with their father but by the time of the next census in 1861 Richard was working on his own again, when in addition to being described as a cordwainer, or master shoemaker, he was also referred to as a 67 year old Chelsea pensioner.

These days we think of Chelsea Pensioners as the red coated ex-service men and women who live in the Royal Hospital, Chelsea, but until 1955 all army pensions were administered and paid from the Royal Hospital. Describing Richard Warnes as a Chelsea pensioner therefore simply reflected the fact that he had an army pension, so we know he must have been a soldier in his early life. By 1871 he and his wife had moved from Tasburgh, possibly to Framingham Pigot as that was where Sarah was buried following her death in 1875, but by 1881 he had returned to the village and was living in Poppy Cottage on Low Road. The census that year also showed that he had got remarried to a local lady from the village by the name of Ann, who at 71 was probably a widow. More significantly however, he was described as being a Waterloo pensioner, proving that not only had he served as a soldier but that aged 18, he had been present at the battle of Waterloo, helping the Duke of Wellington to defeat Napoleon Bonaparte. Richard Warnes died in 1886 at the ripe old age of 93 and was buried at St. Mary's, Long Stratton



Long Stratton Medical Partnership

At a recent meeting of the Patient Participation Group (PPG) we discussed the "Did not attend" patients. These are the patients that have an appointment booked but for whatever reason did not turn up to their appointment. This was also a subject of discussion at a meeting of other PPG's arranged by the ICB and Norfolk Healthwatch.

We discussed the affect this has on the surgery and their ability to give other patients appointments and why we thought it may happen, for which there could be lots of legitimate reasons. From the available data, we know the over 250 patients missed multiple appointments, the overall statistics are shown below. Alarmingly all the missed appointments meant that there were 4.5 weeks' worth of appointments wasted in 2023.



WHAT CAN YOU DO?

- •Please let the surgery know if you need to change arrangements, you can do this by calling the normal surgery number choose option 4 and then option 2, no need to be held in queues or to speak to reception staff.
- If you know a relative has an appointment and needs a helpful reminder if you could do that, it will make a difference to the efficiency for the practice and open availability for other patients.
- If you have any anxiety about attending your appointment please call the practice and seek some help or advice from them.

The surgery may call you when you miss your appointment to check that you are ok.

Let's try to help each other by letting reception know if you no longer require your appointment, please call 01508 530781 option 4 then option 2.

As a PPG we are your voice, there is a committee that meets regularly to discuss topics where we can help, please feel free to email us via the surgery if you want to find out more about us and if you are interested in becoming a committee member.
